

Class One Update

From our learning in RE we designed Sukkots. We made them using fabric and loose parts outside and then shared apple and honey and Challah bread . We talked about all of the Jewish traditions that we have learned about and why Jewish people do these.



We have been focusing on measure in Maths and have been learning about measuring using non-standard and standard units. The children have enjoyed taking their learning into their play and rolling cars down the track and measuring whose cars went the furthest.



The Evil Pea has been on the loose in Class 1 for the past few weeks and we have been writing instructions about how we can catch him! We made our own Supertatos, designed our own traps and even made Supertato cars!



Class Two Update



Year 2 have been learning about shape in Maths, starting with identifying shapes and counting sides and vertices. We really enjoyed using the Geoboards to make different sorts of rectangles and then comparing them to see what was different!

Year 3 have just finished their measurement topic – we used measuring wheels and meter sticks to measure things in the classroom and convert them into cm and mm.







As part of as Rocks, Relics and Rumbles theme, Class Two have been learning about how fossils are formed in Science. We learnt about the process of fossilisation and then we had a go at making our own fossils out of salt dough and small dinosaurs!

Class 2 have been absolutely

loving their recorder lessons this half term. Now we have learnt notes B, A and G. It's tricky to change between when but we have persevered and managed to start following along with different notes to play short tunes. The notes that we have come across so far are crotchets, quavers, minims and dotted crotchets.





In Literacy, we finished writing our biographies about Mary Anning, now we are experts! We know all about where she was from, what her life was like as a child and why she became famous. One of our main targets in this sequence was to use a variety of conjunctions to join clauses together. Our new book is called the Book of Bones – I wonder if you can guess what animals we are going to learn about?

Our RE theme this half term is all about why Easter is so important to

Christians. We have been learning and sequencing the Easter Story as well as thinking about why different symbols may be especially important to Christians around this time and what they may represent.

After Easter, Class Two PE days will be Mondays and Wednesdays.

Class Three update

It has been a busy few weeks in Class 3 as we have battled against covid. With adults and children off at varying times, I have been so impressed with how resilient the children have been; continuing with their learning as they have slotted in and out of class.

In our history lessons the children have used a variety of primary and secondary sources to discover what life was like for children during the Victorian era. They were shocked to discover that children as young as five were often sent out to work to help their families have enough money to buy food. They concluded that the children had to be very brave working for such long hours down the mines and in the factories. The children have examined how changes in laws brought a positive change for the lives of the children during this era.

In the lead up to Easter, the children have examined the text Isaiah 53 and considered whether the 'Suffering servant,' being depicted was Jesus. They have explored the Christian concepts of incarnation and salvation identifying how the sacrifice of Jesus fits into the big story of the Bible. They have also learnt how Christians across the world continue to make sacrifices today in order to help others.

After Easter, Class Three PE days will be Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

Collective Worship

In recent Collective Worships we have talked about the importance of building positive relationships and friendships and how important it is not to hold a grudge and to be able to forgive others, as God has forgiven us. We have spoken about how this can be a hard thing to do but that it is vital if we want to live in a kinder and more peaceful world.

We have linked our value of forgiveness to events that are happening in the Ukraine and how forgiveness will be needed to reconcile the two countries in the future.

- Stick to your usual routine
- Be aware of your own feelings
- Reinforce positive actions

Would you consider being a school governor?

Being a school governor is an exciting opportunity to make a very worthwhile contribution to your local community. The duties of a governor are not onerous, but do require commitment and a willingness to take an active role in supporting the work of each of our five schools.

The Governors of the Jubilee with Pebblebed Federation are responsible for the Church of England primary schools at Broadhembury, Branscombe, Farway, Littleham and Woodbury Salterton. We are a friendly team, committed to ensuring each of the five schools flourish within the Federation.

Apart from the staff governor and the Executive Head Teacher, most of the federation's governors are parents, come from the local community (co-opted governors) or are representatives from the Church. Governors can come from any walk of life, and consequently have a range of skills to complement one another in supporting the school's main functions. We are particularly looking for new governors with skills in finance/accounts or some experience of education (curriculum), but it is not essential.

The governing body has specific statutory responsibilities and its main tasks are: to provide a sense of direction for the work of the school; to support the work of the school as a critical friend; and to hold the school to account for the standards and quality of education it achieves. Training is provided and all governors are subject to the usual safeguarding checks. The role is a voluntary (unpaid) one.

Subject Focus: SCIENCE @ HOME

Make a Lava Lamp

You will need: a small plastic bottle or jar, water, vegetable oil, fizzing tablet, food colouring Fill the bottle up with water about ¼ full. Pour the vegetable oil into the bottle until is almost full. Use a funnel if you have one. Wait a few moments and watch as the oil and water separates.

Then, add a few drops of your favourite colour food colouring. Watch the colour make its way through the oil.

The next step is to break your fizzy tablet in half and drop part of it into the bottle. Watch the bubble blobs form.

Finally, if you have a torch, turn off the lights and drop in another half tablet. Shine the flashlight through the lava lamp while the blobs are bubbling!
